International Conference: "Pirates, Brigands, and Smugglers in the Indian Ocean World

Conference Overview

The conference will take place in Peterson Hall, room 116, on Thursday, May 17th, and Friday, May 18th, 2018.

Peterson Hall is located at 3460 rue McTavish, on the McGill University campus. A map is included at the end of this document.

We will begin on Thurday with breakfast and registration starting at 9:00 am. Please arrange to arrive at Peterson Hall no later than 9:20 am, so as not to delay or interrupt the first presentations of the day. We will end at approximately 4:45 pm, followed by a guided walk up Mt. Royal.

On Friday we will begin with breakfast at 9:30 am followed by the first panel at 10 am. Friday's session will conclude at 3:00 pm, and we will reconvene at Philino's restaurant for the conference dinner at 6 pm.

Registration

Registration will take place between 9:00am and 9:30am on Thursday, May 17th. The registration fee is \$200 CAD (\$100 CAD for registered graduate students). Receipts will be issued upon request. Payment is in cash - unfortunately we are not equipped to accept credit or debit card payments.

Registration includes breakfast, lunch, coffee, and light snacks on both days of the conference, as well as the conference dinner on the evening of Friday, May 18th. Partners are welcome to attend the conference dinner, but are required to pay \$60 CAD.

Presentation Format

Presentations will be limited to 20 minutes each. Each panel will consist of three presentations, followed by approximately 30 minutes of questions and discussion.

Paper Formatting Guidelines

It is not necessary to submit a completed paper before the conference, but as we intend to move quickly to publication of selected papers afterwards, please note the following:

- All papers should be approximately 8,000 to 9,000 words, including footnotes (i.e. use footnotes) and bibliography.
- Footnotes, which should be limited to bibliographical entries, should follow the Chicago Manual of Style, 16th edition: http://arts.pdn.ac.lk/ichss/content/Chicago_Manual_of_Style.pdf
- Illustrations should include, wherever possible, clear black and while maps and images. For publication, all images will be in black and white.
- Illustrations (JPG and TIFF acceptable) should be at least 3x5 inches/5x3 inches/1000x1500 pixels at 300 dpi. Failing that, use the largest image available.
- In any ensuing publication, you will be required to obtain permission for any illustrations etc. that you include in your work.
